## Corscombe & Halstock Community First Responders

We have been asked how Responders are called to an incident. The answer is that we are **not** called directly by the public but by the Ambulance Service.

If you have a medical emergency, then you should call 999. Ambulance Control will dispatch an ambulance, if appropriate, and also decide whether or not to request Responders to attend.

In fact, Responders are not allowed to attend the scene of an accident or incident without first gaining permission from Ambulance Control. If we are approached directly by the public, then we must first contact Ambulance Control, who will then either ask that we respond, and/or dispatch other suitable resources.

Because we are a small team of volunteers, we are not able to provide cover 24 hours a day. We generally provide cover from early evening until the following morning, most days of the week. Ambulance Control knows when we are available and when we are not, and so is able to deploy us when needed without wasting time.

We would like more volunteers to join our team. Anyone joining receives training, and is well supported by the Ambulance Service and by the team. Why not contact us to ask for more information. 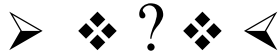

### **Ice and Snow On The Roads This Winter**

I think we all know there are times and conditions when we'll be snowed in. Fact of life. Salting icy roads lowers the freezing point and can help but melted ice on top of not-yet-melted ice is lethal. Compacted snow acts as a thick ice layer too. Please be sensible. Think!

The Highways Dept has stockpiled extra salt this year but are not going to routinely salt as many roads in the county. All the roads between the A356 and A37 are excluded from gritting - Corscombe, Halstock, Benville and Evershot - we are on our own.

The salt bins provided by the Parish Council have been filled, and will be refilled as and when possible. Parish salt is only for use on public roads. People stealing it for their drives etc are antisocial. Please buy your own.

If you can help, use a spade or shovel and spread salt thinly over an icy surface. Thicker layers of salt do not give quicker results and are wasteful. Carry a small bag of grit/sand (not salt) in your car (buy from builder's merchant). A sprinkle of this under tyres can get a skidding car moving. Salt just makes things slipperier.

Don't go out unless you have to. Don't take risks which put you and rescuers in danger.

#### **Improved Broadband Service For Corscombe & Halstock**

BT is presently involved in work to upgrade the quality of Broadband service throughout the country over the next 5 years. This is being done on a priority basis, partly depending on the result of a poll which is being conducted on a dedicated website - [www.racetoinfinity.bt.com/](http://www.racetoinfinity.bt.com/). Because the Corscombe exchange has less than 1000 subscribers we need to get 75% of ALL subscribers (not just those with broadband service) to vote. We need to get 483 votes (there are 643 subscribers) and at the time of writing (Nov 3) we had 90 votes cast. We need 393 more!

So, ALL phone subscribers who are on the Corscombe exchange – phone numbers beginning 891---, if you have not yet voted, PLEASE, go to the above website and cast your vote. If you do not use a computer/the internet please ask someone else to vote for you to help us reach the target. They will need you name, address (including Postcode) and phone number. One vote per premises.

Because we have less than 1000 subscribers on the exchange, we must get 483 votes before BT will even talk to us about getting this improved service so PLEASE cast your vote. Voting closes on December 31<sup>st</sup> 2010. This is a legitimate and perfectly safe website to access for those of you concerned about viruses.

**Mrs Margaret Mary Clark, Halstock**

Margaret Clark passed away on 1<sup>st</sup> September at Yeovil Hospital after being admitted a few days before, following a fall in her home.

Margaret was born on 25<sup>th</sup> April 1920 at her parent's home in Enfield, only daughter of Frank and Florence Stamford. Her father was a schoolteacher although from a long established farming family rooted in Bassingbourne and her mother was of the well known Cater and Death clothing families of Colchester and also a qualified teacher. Both were strictly Edwardian in their outlook and approach to life and this very much influenced and shaped Margaret's attitudes and values throughout her own life – which neither WW2 or the post-war liberalisation had much success in changing. Her father had a deep interest in political history and natural science and she often recounted how he used to take her on long walks in the countryside studying flora and fauna, and also to political rallies and speeches by notable orators of the time. Her mother was not amused, this being considered an 'inappropriate' education for a girl!

Nevertheless Margaret had a deep sense of humour as well as a talent for art and her ambition was to become a cartoonist with a regional or national newspaper. However her mother felt that teaching would be a much more 'appropriate' career and on matriculation in

1938 she started college in London training as a teacher in domestic science. In her latter school years she developed an aptitude for tennis and through the Enfield Tennis Club, played successfully at County standard tournaments. She met her husband-to-be Richard Clark, another highly competitive player, at the Club and was also at school with his sisters Joyce and Muriel (later Hibbitt).

At the start of WW2 Margaret's training college was relocated to a requisitioned hotel in Bournemouth where she completed her studies and on graduation, returned to London as a supply teacher in the Enfield and Edmonton areas. Richard volunteered for service in the Royal Navy and after brief training at Dartmouth RN College at rank of Warrant Officer Schoolmaster; they married in Enfield on 20<sup>th</sup> August 1942. Immediately his first posting was to the Isle of Man Gunnery School and Margaret went to join him, taking out Manx citizenship. By mid September 1942 however he was re-posted to Chatham RN Dockyard and they relocated to a rented flat in Chatham, whilst Richard joined the cruiser HMS Ajax for post-refit trials and crew gunnery training. He remained with the ship when it sailed for the Mediterranean, so Margaret returned to Enfield to resume supply teaching and was involved in fire watching and civil defence duties at schools in the heavily targeted area of north east London for the rest of the War.

For much of the War she had little idea where her husband was, except one day when he turned up suddenly with a trunk full of luxuries from New York, where HMS Ajax had finished up for repairs after being bombed in Bone. He spent much of the rest of the War at the Portsmouth Gunnery Training School, out of reach and contact behind the D-Day security cordon and it wasn't until the end of 1945 that they were fully re-united.

On extricating himself from the Navy her husband obtained a teaching position in the Enfield area, they bought their first house and first son Michael was born in August 1946, followed by Peter in May 1950. Then taking up his appointment as Head of Science at one of the

UK's first and experimental comprehensive schools in Hillingdon, they relocated to Ickenham for the next 14 years, during which time Margaret resumed teaching domestic science at Swakely's Girls Secondary Modern School in the same borough. She left teaching when Richard was appointed Head of a secondary modern school in Neasden (featured in the location shots of the BBC TV series "Please Sir") and he remained as Head when it became one of London's largest comprehensive schools. This was a very deprived area of London with 75% of the pupils being of immigrant background with English not their first language, so Margaret's role in supporting her husband at a very challenging time was key and demanding.

They moved to Pinner in 1964, her husband retired in 1971 but continued in part time teaching at a private school until 1980. Then in 1986 with his health declining they moved to St. Juthware Close in Halstock to be near to son Michael and sister Muriel Hibbitt. Richard died in November 1989 after a long illness, during which Margaret was his devoted carer until he was admitted to a specialist care home in Weymouth for the last few months of his life.

Thereafter she had control of her own life, something which she relished and she became more involved with the village community and her wider family which included three grand-daughters, Andrea, Corinna and Claire in their teenage years. She was prominent in helping to start the Pot Luck Lunch initiative and stayed with it until her own health became less robust in the new Millennium. In her 70's she took up occasional tennis again, "to teach her grand-daughters how to play properly", and she treasured her car and freedom to drive where she wanted. Her husband had taught her to drive in the 1960's but was always an outspoken 'back seat driver' in her regard, so in earlier days she was not beyond "borrowing" her sons' sporty cars to escape for some peace and quiet on the open road. She also had acquired a taste for foreign travel from visiting old friends relocated in France and Denmark and then more ambitiously, Michael and Diane in North West Frontier, Pakistan; so there followed trips to the

USA, Italy and Portugal. Notably and perhaps mercifully, the only times in her life that she truly relaxed and did not want to be in schoolmistress mode of being in charge of everything, was on an aeroplane!

Even in her final years with her mobility and eyesight declining, she took great pride in those things she could achieve within her control and she never compromised her standards and the way she wanted things done and to be, particularly her garden and the organisation of her home. She was immensely happy to live to see a great-grandson and very proud of her three grand-daughters achievements academically and in mapping their own careers, something she had never been allowed to do.

Margaret was essentially a loving, caring and supportive wife, mother, grandmother and great-grandmother and whilst she kept a very firm grip on management of family and home, she was never at ease with the compromises and pressures on her standards that life in the last half of the 20<sup>th</sup> Century brought upon her. We, her sons, remember and appreciate happy childhoods full of freedom, encouragement and self confidence instilled in us by her and key to achieving our own ambitions; she is loved in our memory of her and will be much missed.
