### **Doing Honest Business in Africa – is that possible?**

Let's face it – the newspapers contain more bad news than good news when it comes to Africa. So it was very interesting for men at the Melbury Men's Breakfast on Saturday morning of March 19<sup>th</sup> to hear of the positive experiences of Graham Carr, an accountant who has lived in East Africa for many years. Having trained in the UK he worked in and set up accountancy businesses in Kenya, Uganda and Malawi. Graham told of his times during the Idi Amin era in Uganda when he and his family were not at all sure what was going to happen. On one occasion he and his wife felt it right to leave but they were stopped by somewhat menacing guards at the border with Kenya. Looking for bribes or something to steal, the guards noticed a large box in the car and wanted to know what was in it. So Graham took out the Accordion and played some Christian songs; the guards happily joined in! Graham and family were waved through the customs barrier.

Graham acknowledged the integrity of the Christian leaders in the church, many of them suffering for being honest. He maintained high standards for audit and accountability and has been enormously thrilled to see his companies continuing to do well and being awarded prizes for honesty – so much so that they now audit for large international companies and agencies.

It was right for family and work reasons to return to the UK but before long Graham and his wife (who does some amazing work in training talented musicians and arranging for pianos to be delivered to Uganda) returned to Africa for several more years. Graham shared with us his experiences of having to trust in God in difficult situations and how his personal Christian faith had been a wonderful guide as well as a strength when making commercial and family decisions. A remarkable account of a life lived as a close follower of Jesus. Graham made it clear that whatever our job or situation, God is present and will guide if we ask Him.

### **Ladybirds Playgroup and Toddlers**

We are delighted to welcome Freddie and his family to our playgroup, and look forward to watching him develop and become part of all the fun. Now that we have kinder weather we are spending the majority of our time out of doors. Most children prefer to be outside and many children become more confident learners while outdoors. Boys in particular are far more likely to paint and draw when they are outside, they like the larger scale opportunities and the fact that it is less formal so are more likely to experiment with areas of learning that they would steer clear of indoors. It is at this time of year that the staff team really appreciate the facilities the Village Hall offers. We can open the front door and allow the children to choose where they would like to play, and allow them the opportunity to alternate between being indoors and out. We are also making good use of our fantastic sensory garden area and have been watching the seeds we have recently planted, grow.

Marie is coming towards the end of her Level Three course and has been doing us proud again. She has managed to gain a distinction for all her latest course work, so should be on target to qualify at this higher level with another overall distinction; she puts a lot of time and effort into her studies and deserves the rewards. Whilst Marie is away on college days we are very lucky to be able to call on Kate Bartlett as a replacement member of staff. Kate joins us on Forest School days and is a great asset.

Our government funding is now operating on a different formula and unusually we find ourselves benefitting. It has been recognised that small rural groups struggle to cope financially and we will now be given more funding per child than larger groups in urban areas. It would be nice to think that in the future we can target our fund-raising to keep improving our resources rather than having to use it just to pay the bills. I hope it will also make our committee members' jobs easier by relieving some of the financial pressures.
