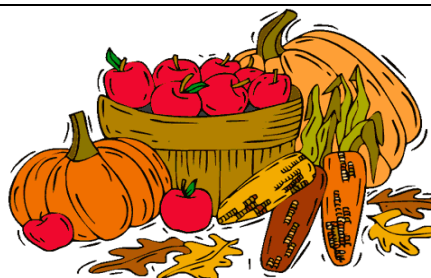
Melbury Men's Breakfast – Hot Potatoes in July

The MMB which meets every two months on a Saturday morning normally has a very interesting

George Ellis fills the Church

George Ellis was laid to rest last month in Corscombe churchyard after a moving service of remembrance taken by Team Rector Graham Perryman in the presence of 150 family members and friends. They included a strong contingent from the Royal British Legion's Halstock Branch, of which he had been first Chairman and then President for a total of no fewer than 27 years.

He now lies in a green and peaceful place, appropriate to one whose war service had been with the 14th Army in the Far East, most notably in the grim horrors of Kohima, from which has derived the now-famous epitaph: 'When you go home, tell them of us, and say: For your tomorrow we gave our today'.

That was many years ago, but now remembered every year in November. In his enlightening tribute at the service, Glen Tavener, a Corscombe neighbour of long standing, recalled how George had returned to marry local girl Win in 1948 to begin a happy and life-long partnership.

With her help they ran a building and undertaking business and were instrumental in the conversion of the village school into the present village hall. They were very much to the fore in the local social life and were active members of the Chideock Farmers Discussion Group. Ever a keen sportsman, his interests ranged from the local point-to-point and the Cattistock Hunt, to cricket and football.

Glen recalls that he and Win gained Millie as a daughter when John married, and in time became proud grand-parents to Jane and Michael. In due time, Jane joined the military, rising to the rank of Major, while Michael joined the family building business – with the same values as George. Thus the two abiding motivations, the army and building, as Glen put it, ‘flowed down through the generations’.

At the end of the service, Simon Roriston went ahead of the coffin carrying the Branch Standard, while other members, led by Branch Chairman Alan Jakeman, lined the route to the grave.

George would certainly have been pleased and proud to see the church-filling congregation unpack itself and struggle up the hill over the slippery grass to the graveside. There the Rector read the beautiful words from the 21st Psalm: ‘I will lift up mine eyes unto the hills from whence cometh my help ...’ after he had pronounced the Committal. So there, in this quiet place, he lies. The sun will shine, the wind will blow, the rain will fall. He will be at peace; but not forgotten, never forgotten.

A pink bath towel, soaked, folded and placed on the hot asbestos roof above the nest was found to protect the nestlings from the extreme heat.

David Francis Pring

David Francis Pring was born on the 14th January, 1934, at Pondclose Farm, to Jessie and Edgar Pring, dairy farmers. Although having severely restricted sight, he proceeded to prove that was no handicap. He first attended school at Closworth and then as a boarder at Exeter. He came home to run the farm, while still finding time to take up speed and distance cycling and photography (especially light/colour and the landscape). In 1961, having met on Killin Bridge in Scotland, David and Marguerite were married in Halstock Church, a decision which led to fifty years, bar eleven days, of wedlock; two daughters, Sarah and Honor; three tall grandsons, Sam, Will and Craig; and a great deal of fun.

Due to further sight restrictions, David sold the farm and retired in 1988, still living on part of the farmland. He and Marguerite took up long distance walking, leading many groups, and indulged their love of music, history, wildlife and earth sciences, David managing an Open University degree unsuited to his level of sight but great fun all the same! The discovery of a regrowing tumour caused health problems but not sufficient to restrict travel around Europe, following Roman tracks and listening to wildlife, nor to walking, as it was at this time that the Parish Walks Group was created with David always the fastest pair of boots! The most hospitable of men, he loved entertaining and giving Marguerite marks out of ten for cuisine!

Sadly, a chest infection last winter became ever more serious and he spent five weeks and then twelve weeks in Yeovil Hospital, before losing the fight at last, Marguerite and the girls with him. He was much loved - a kinder, funnier gentleman did not exist and the way he will be missed was shown by the funeral, which had been designed by his daughters to reflect the man and his life.

On Thursday, 28th July, he was buried in Halstock Churchyard after a service which described David. It saw Sarah playing the old organ, as had her grandmother; the flowers were simple (wild flowers, sweet-peas and English garden blooms, designed by Helen, arranged and supplied by friends and neighbours. There were no sweet-peas left in Halstock!); simple farming hymns, the poem "Skylark" and "The Lark Ascending", preceded by favourite pieces; an amusing and true address by Honor, describing pictorial memories of her Dad. The final touch was provided by our stalwart Pot Luck team providing the refreshments for the beautifully decorated hall.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank all those in the medical professions who contributed to David's ability to make the most of his life; to all those who put together the funeral and made it such an unforgettable occasion; to all the Clubs who sent representatives; to all those who sent good wishes, and finally, to all those who came.

David always said that he didn't want to move as long as the great Oak stood at the bottom of Pondclose, and he never did. They had a great deal in common.
